Legislative News

Update On Legislative Action

With a new governor and a magnifying lens on creating housing opportunities, this year's legislative session is awash in bills relating to housing, grants for construction, expanding developable land areas, and tax incentives for ownership.

The Appraisal Institute advocates for our membership and for the profession in general, so we typically do not take a position

on these sorts of issues. Nonetheless, as they can move markets, I want to make sure you, my fellow Chapter members, are aware that these discussions are happening. The Governor's office seems serious in trying to find ways to bring her stated goal of 36,000 new housing units annually to the state. The legislature is seeing the fruits of work-groups on housing and is moving legislation on the topic.

This session has two bills relating to real estate appraisal activity. Fortunately, in the eyes of this committee, these are friendly topics.

<u>HB 2287</u> is a house-keeping bill put forth at the request of our licensure board. It "Clarifies that Appraiser Certification and Licensure Board is responsible for determining specified criteria for registration or certification of appraisal management companies." This won't change anything, merely clarifies the apparatus currently in place.

<u>SB 702</u>"Allows (the) Appraisal Certification and Licensure Board to require training on implicit bias and state federal fair housing laws for real estate appraisers." There is a slower-moving federal push for similar language, so in the eyes of this committee this only helps us get ready for something that is coming our way. It will create a requirement for continuing education on bias and fair housing rules with your license renewal cycles. Anyone who has taken USPAP or Ethics recently has seen some of this content already, and that coursework may already satisfy this requirement.

On a larger scale, The Appraisal Foundation will be having a public meeting on March 22 to discuss some proposals for new education at the time of issuance of the 2024-2025 USPAP to include a new 7-hour USPAP course and a 4-hour course on fair housing regulations to be required of all licensed appraisers. He took such pride in being a fun, kind and involved figure in their lives.

Refugee Restart Kits Needed

As many of you may recall, last August our chapter served in the community by assembling/delivering food and restart kits for refugees that have recently come to Oregon. Countries of origin for many of these refugees are Ukraine, Afghanistan, Syria and other countries in the middle east and Africa.

My local contact at Refugee Care Collective recently reached out to me and said that the need is substantial with all of the refugees coming in over the last 6-12 months and all of their kits are depleted. Our Chapter has volunteered to supply at least 25 kits and Refugee Care Collectives goal is to supply at least 300 kits between now and June.

Mark your calendars for Saturday May 20th where we will assemble and deliver these kits. An exact place and time is yet to be determined but will likely be around 9am on that day.

Most refugees arrive to the United States with next to nothing, but you can help them rebuild their lives by putting together a restart kit. Types of kits needed are personal care, welcome, kitchen, baby, bedding, bathroom and cleaning. The average cost of each of these kits is \$72 to \$193. We are looking for donations from individuals and/or firms to purchase and deliver the needed items for each of these kits. We also encourage you to include a hand-written, unsealed note welcoming the family.

We will be sending out a sign up list where you can volunteer to supply the items in however many restart kits you choose to donate. More information on the items that go into each restart kit will be forthcoming.
